Rocky Mountain Bonsai Society Collection Update

2019 saw the celebration of our 50th Anniversary Bonsai Exhibition, and the dedication of a new collection of bonsai during our awards ceremony on Friday September 6th, 2019. The "Rocky Mountain Bonsai Society Collection" was an idea hatched early that year by Adam Johnson and Tom Anglewicz when repotting a lodgepole pine that had been styled by visiting artist Ryan Neil of Bonsai Mirai. They wondered how this tree could make a bigger impact for both the RMBS membership and the public at large.

This lodgepole pine (styled by Ryan Neil), and a ponderosa pine designed by Bjorn Bjorholm became the first bonsai to represent RMBS and the spirt of our first 50 years of formal display and enjoyment of the art of bonsai. It seems fitting that both species are Rocky Mountain natives.

The Rocky Mountain Bonsai Society Collection will be curated and cared for by our members with the intent of being an educational resource for RMBS (we will further the style and refinement of these bonsai) and also a collection that may be displayed in whole or part to advance the enjoyment and appreciation of bonsai for our community. We anticipate adding bonsai specimens in the future and codifying the mission and vision for these artworks and how they might add value for everyone involved.

Here is an update on each tree two-years out from professional styling. They look Amazing.

RMBS Bonsai #1 Lodgepole Pine (pinus contorta):

This lodgepole pine was initially collected by RMBS members Jeff Sczechowski and Larry Jackel in 2013. This tree was part of Jeff's collection when he moved from Colorado to California and gifted some of his larger specimens to RMBS members. I have cared for the tree since the time of Jeffs departure. In May 2018 this tree was chosen as a subject for a demonstration by visiting professional artist Ryan Neil from International Bonsai Mirai. Ryan's aim was to keep the "lodgepole pine nature" of this very straight trunked tree (which is a natural habit of this species).

To accomplish his vision, Ryan wanted to showcase the naturally occurring deadwood on the main trunk. A bulky upper branch which serves as an offshoot of the primary trunk formed an odd u-shape. Rather than hiding this unusual feature, Ryan performed a wedge-cut on this thick branch, and guy-wired this to the main trunk to create a more acute angle. This made a secondary trunk with an identical inclination to the main line of the composition. Ryan used 4-guage wire to complete the heavy bends and form a graceful spreading canopy with the larger branches. The nearly straight angle of inclination emanating from the trunk on major branches is characteristic of the species. Ryan completed the work by balancing the energy of the tree by needle plucking and additional foliage management.

Since this time, the tree has grown very well and has put on nice masses of foliage. The Lodgepole has been treated with the established single-flush short needle pine technique and has responded with health and vigor. The bonsai was potted into a suitable ceramic training pot from the rectangular plastic container in spring of 2019.

This tree continues to build ramification and grace. The secondary trunk wedge-cut has healed very nicely and is almost imperceptible unless you know where to look. The tree continues to generate back-budding and will have some additional deadwood work and carving performed on the stumpy branches that were left low on the trunk during initial collection of this tree.

RMBS Bonsai #2 Ponderosa Pine (pinus ponderosa):

This Ponderosa Pine was collected by former RMBS member Jeff Szechowski and Larry Jackel in either 2013 or 2014. In early 2016 Jeff and his family were preparing to move to California, and Jeff had three large Ponderosas that he wanted to get into bonsai containers. He brought all three trees, including this one, to my home in April of that year and we reported them. I had a large mica pot that we put this tree into, with good bonsai soil. Because this pine had a long, horizontal major branch, Jeff thought that it resembled the profile of the RMBS "logo" tree originally styled by Bob Kataoka. He offered to donate the tree to RMBS and suggested that it might be developed as a "clone" of the logo tree. I offered that that might be possible but that we would have to see what options the tree presented once it was ready to be worked. The tree was left in my care.

I allowed the tree to grow for the balance of 2016 and all through 2017. It grew vigorously and showed good health. No work was done during this period except to remove third-year needles that naturally drop in the fall. The tree was heavily fertilized from spring through fall. Jeff had indicated that he was comfortable with either Larry or me styling the tree; but, since Bjorn Bjorholm was to be in Colorado in 2018, I suggested that we have Bjorn style the tree as his demo to the club. Jeff concurred, and the initial styling took place on July 10th, 2018. I conveyed to Bjorn Jeff's idea of making this tree a clone of Bob Kataoka's much earlier design but emphasized that he should style the tree as he saw fit. He studied photos of the Kataoka tree and acknowledged that a similar design direction might be possible for this one.

To my surprise, and probably that of others, one of Bjorn's first moves was to remove and jin the long, horizontal signature branch that originally suggested the comparison to our logo tree! I suspect that he immediately saw that this branch was just too long to be a valuable part of the overall composition. Instead, he did a major bend on a second branch that placed it in a similar position on the opposite side of the pine. Then he proceeded to wire out the remaining branches to create the semi-cascade form that became the eventual design, everything in much better proportion.

After the demo I took the tree back home, and it has been growing nicely since. Though it has an initial structural styling, the tree is still largely in development. I have continued to fertilize it, spring through fall. It has developed back buds and increased foliage mass, which, with single-flush long-needle pines will eventually result in shorter needles. If the tree continues to thrive, I will repot it again in spring of 2021, hopefully into a container worthy of its quality. The container also needs to be smaller in size, assuming that we can safely reduce the root mass. This wonderful Ponderosa should hopefully be ready to show in another two years.
